"Trust Women" Book Discussion

Carolyn White shares with Friends:

As we move into the second year following the Dobbs ruling which overturned Roe and face even more abortion restrictions here in North Carolina, I would like to form a small group to discuss the book Trust Women: a Progressive Christian Argument for Reproductive Justice by Rebecca Todd Peters, a professor of Religious Studies at Elon College. By the end of the 3 meetings, I hope that we have a better understanding of how abortion fits into a normal part of women's reproductive lives, how the conservative Christian movement has shamed and judged women, and how we as Quakers can frame our own moral argument for abortion access and reproductive justice.

The group will meet three times on the third Wednesday (Sept 20, Oct 18 and Nov 15) at Carolyn White's house (300 Tripp Farm Rd, Chapel Hill) from 7:00 to 8:30 PM. We can be a hybrid group if there are people who would prefer to meet by Zoom. The book is available online or by ordering at local bookstores, though I will make sure one copy is available in the library. We will discuss three chapters at each meeting.

Ride Needed to CHFM


Hello friends.

- 1. Ann, as Clerk, led Friends in opening worship and presented the Query: "We have it within our power to begin the world over again" (Thomas Paine). How do I "change the world" in my daily practices? One Friends spoke out of the silence, noting that we are each a small part of a great huge whole. She has been making it a practice to detach from outcomes, seeking to live deeply into her inner light, being part of a community that takes action with faith and hope.
- 2. Ann welcomed Friends and reviewed the agenda. There were no first-time attenders.
- 3. Susan presented the Minutes of the May Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB). They were considered and approved.
- 4. Carolyn White for Nominations committee presented the annual report. It is attached here as Appendix 1. The report was accepted with gratitude for the committee's ongoing work.
- 5. Carolyn White for Nominations committee presented the proposed committee slates for 2023-24, with a few changes from the presentation last month. It is attached here as Appendix 2. Friends considered, clarified, and approved the slate, with appreciation for the committee's work.
- 6. Ann reported that she has received a request for membership from Campo Larrick, and read the letter. Friends expressed appreciation and referred the matter to Ministry & Worship to form a clearness committee.

- 7. Ann reported that Betsy Brinson has come forward to be proposed as our new representative to American Friends Service Committee. The meeting approved the appointment with delight that she feels this calling, confident she will make a difference in the role.
- 8. Jeff Brown for the Ministry and Worship committee presented the results of a survey on blended Meeting for Worship and recommendations. It is attached here as Appendix 3. Friends commented:
 - "Let us see what love can do."
 - Several spoke on their desire for more frequent blended meetings.
 - "I appreciate the experience of the presence of Friends from afar."
 - Several commented on their preference for the experience of either Zoom worship or in-person worship, over the blended experience.
 - "Our process in coming to consensus, no matter how long it takes, is important. It is a decision we will make for ourselves, sooner or later, and I appreciate Ministry & Worship's thoughtfulness in the process."
 - "I feel vulnerable when there is a camera, so am grateful that there are places to sit away from the camera. I want us to be inclusive but also provide safety."

Ministry & Worship will continue to sit with this.

- 9. Monteze Snyder for Finance committee announced the hiring of an accountant, Peggy James. Maura Murphy and David Waterman and she made up the search committee. They are pleased with the choice. Maura will help with the transition over the coming weeks.
- 10. Monteze Snyder for Finance committee presented the proposed budget for FY 2023-24, which is attached here as Appendix 4, then responded to questions and comments, making clarifications. Friends approved the budget.
- 11. Ann, as Clerk, presented a minute of appreciation for Maura Murphy's service as Treasurer: We are very grateful to Maura Murphy for over 10 years of service in the role of Chapel Hill Friends Meeting Treasurer. She did excellent work for us, improving the reporting systems for Meeting finances, transitioning many banking functions to use online services, and implementing electronic giving through the website. She patiently guided our Finance committee and Meeting members as we endeavored to live our faith through good stewardship of our financial resources. Maura shared her gifts and talents faithfully—our community is blessed by her presence. Friends approved the minute with enthusiasm.
- 12. Ann as Clerk called for other concerns of members, announcing a time for unseasoned concerns that arise, if any, to be identified only and simply heard or referred.

Jeff Brown offered a minute of appreciation for Jan Hutton's faithful clerking of the Zoom committee since the spring of 2020: She navigated a range of challenges presented by technology and by the varying needs and perspectives of Friends. She always responded lovingly and we are grateful to her for keeping the committee as well as our community together through challenging times. Friends approved the minute.

13. Ann announced that our next Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business is planned for 9:00 AM on 7/16/2023. She has a schedule conflict so Jennifer Leeman will clerk the meeting. There will be no MWAB in August. MWAB will resume on 9/17/2023.

Nominations Committee Annual Report, May 2023

Committees form the structure of the Meeting and do the Meeting's work. The Meeting's work includes caring for the Meeting's members and their spiritual development, its meetings for worship, its property and finances, its religious education, outreach and social action. Committees serve the Meeting by studying issues and making seasoned recommendations to the monthly Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB). Members and attenders are encouraged to actively engage with the Meeting through committee work both for the appreciation of community each participant gains and for the organizational health of the Meeting.

The role of the Nominations committee is to discern the needs of the committees and to identify members and attenders whose gifts fit with each committee's role and responsibilities. Most of our work is accomplished between January and May, with regular meetings via Zoom.

The committee is very grateful to the Care and Counsel and Publications and Communications committees for the 2022 CHFM directory. We are also grateful to the Hospitality Committee which keeps an online record of new attenders. This year, we celebrate the fact that 11 new members and attenders are serving on a committee for the first time. They have helped fill positions that were vacant in the previous year.

We continue to be challenged to fill all of our committee openings. This year, we were tasked to discern a new treasurer as well as adding additional volunteers to the Finance Committee. Several other committees could also use more volunteers. We hope to eventually fill these vacancies.

In September, we ask that the clerk of the Meeting appoint a "Naming Committee" of two people who will discern three new members for the Nominations committee. (Annette Broadwell, Leslie Rountree and Carolyn White are rotating off). Those names should be approved at the December MWAB as Nominations will begin its work again in January 2024.

Survey Results and Comments to Ministry & Worship Blended survey Summary

For the last three years, Chapel Hill Friends Meeting has offered a variety of options for worship, allowing members and attenders to make their own best choice. These include virtual worship via Zoom, small group in-person worship at 8:15 AM, in-person worship at 11:00 AM (also, First Day School), a worship group at Carol Woods Retirement Community and a hybrid or blended worship once a month at 11:00 AM whereby the meeting room is a Zoom participant, blending in-person and online worship.

The Ministry & Worship Committee supports the spiritual life of the community by evaluating and supporting these options for worship. The committee reviews the quality of worship during each monthly committee meeting. Ministry & Worship is mindful about building community and strives for ways to unify our members and attenders even when they may worship at different times.

The committee asked you about your experience with worship and especially with hybrid or blended worship. We received 70 survey responses in April. This morning, I would like to summarize the responses and comments.

We received many thoughtful comments by survey respondents.

There was a strong affirmation of need and gratitude for having Zoom Meeting for Worship, especially for those who live far away or cannot attend in person for health reasons. Almost all respondents felt that having a blended MFW was a good idea. At least 6 people responded that they did not like blended MFW (too many distractions, awkward, interferes with worship) but would be fine with blended once per month. About the same number of people felt that we should have blended MFW every week (concern about splitting into separate groups, sense of community). Most respondents were fine with once or maybe twice per month.

Some concerns about blended MFW include: distraction of microphone; not being able to hear; awkward; less a path to a gathered meeting; messages on Zoom are too frequent and too long; screen so small that we can't see the Zoom participants.

One comment stated the fear of becoming 2 separate groups. However, another person commented how much they loved early MFW with its quiet. Several comments mentioned the warm sense of community with the Zoom worship group. Another commented that weekly blended MFW was not necessary for sustaining a sense of community for those who cannot attend in person.

Other suggestions included: making mask wearing optional; have an evening MFW (either Zoom or in person); continue to work out the bugs with the microphone, etc.

The survey responses were informative about worship experience, but did not clarify a path for worship. Our blended meeting practice continues to evolve. The Zoom subcommittee has consistently supported a blended meeting on the first First Day of each month, using equipment scoped and acquired last year. The Zoom subcommittee continues to seek a better solution for getting audio to the Zoom connection

than the current use of a hand-held microphone. More testing of audio equipment will take place after ventilation improvements that can retire the window fans in the meeting room.

The Ministry & Worship Committee recommends that the Meeting continue to hold blended meetings for worship on the first First Day of the month for now, with continued attention to the evolving practice.

Ministry & Worship also appreciates other options for participating in the Meeting community, including forums, MWAB, Prayers for Healing, committee meetings, and small groups.
