Since AVP was founded in 1975, the nonprofit organization has given over 15,000 workshops in the U.S. and many more internationally. Most North Carolina AVP workshops are offered in prisons, where research has shown the training reduces recidivism by 47% and anger by 30% to well below the norm for Americans in general.

Report from Quaker House

Curt Torrell shares with Friends:

Quaker House continues its fine work. Executive Director Wayne Finegar will be making numerous trips to monthly and yearly meetings throughout the summer to shine a light on Quaker House and peacemaking.

The GI Rights Hotline counselors reported a recent case of an Army Reservist seeking a conscientious objector discharge. This person entered the U.S. as an immigrant with a green card and eventually got citizenship. He joined the army because he saw how tightly it operated in his home country during its civil strife. He wanted to be part of that kind of organization. Instead, he eventually felt the army made him feel like a murderer.

The Hotline counselor and a Hotline trainee were allowed to be with him during his first CO investigative hearing. The Hotline trainee, an Iraqi War veteran, spoke glowingly on behalf of the soldier and the sincerity of his CO application. The investigative officer was not sure how to take this from a vet, but all believed the first hearing went well.

It will be months as this person's application works its way up the chain of command, and hopefully he will not be forced to deploy. The Quaker House counselors will stand by his side during these months and give him support to endure.

Bridging the Gap

Dottie Heninger shares with Friends:

Quakers in Chapel Hill are raising money to support three James Cates Scholarships provided through the Bridging the Gap organization. These scholarships cost \$1,000 each and go to assist high school students in completing projects related to their own history and their aspirations. Bridging the Gap, led by the remarkable Danita Mason Hogans (she recently presented a forum for CHFM and served as a speaker in our February meeting retreat), works with descendants of enslaved people in Orange County. 1. Ann, as Clerk, opened our meeting with worship and presented the Query: *How can I be a blessing to others?*
2. Ann welcomed Friends and reviewed the agenda. There were no first time attenders.
3. Susan had prepared the Minutes of the May 2024 Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB). They were considered and approved.
4. Ann as Clerk and Carolyn White presented the following "Nimble Friends" minute, which had been approved by the Ministry & Worship committee on May 6, 2024:

Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB) is a corporate search for spiritual direction and unity. It usually relies upon the clarity gained from committee discernment and recommendation. When asked to make quick decisions, our clerk's general response must be "No, thank you. That's not the kind of decision-making our faith and practice provide." On rare occasions when the immediate action is clearly covered by our Quaker testimonies and the Meeting has already made decisions similar to the one requested, the Meeting clerk will contact the Ministry and Worship and Care and Counsel clerks for guidance. When unity is gained

among the three seasoned Friends, the Clerk will proceed with her/his decision and report the decision to the following MWAB.

The minute was approved.

5. Dottie Heninger reported that Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting and Fellowship approved signing on to the AFSC statement “Quaker organizations vision for peace in Palestine and Israel” at the annual sessions 6/1/24. She explained that this minute follows one adopted in 2023 that emphasized Quaker principle, and that this minute is a call for action. It is available online at

Friends appreciated the update. Friends were also glad to hear that Joe Groves, Wendy Michener, Hart Pillow and Tom Munk have arranged a meeting with Thom Tillis legislative assistant, Stephanie Blair to urge action towards a ceasefire, to which we are all invited. They may soon bring us a proposal for a new ad hoc committee to continue working for a ceasefire in Gaza.

6. Matt Drake, for the Ad hoc Schoolhouse Committee, presented the ten-year lease agreement to begin Aug 1, 2024 with Carolina Friends School. It was published in the minutes of our May MWAB and was approved by the Committee June 14, 2024. The committee recommends that the lease be approved and then the ad hoc committee be laid down. Friends asked questions for clarification on changes from the previous agreement, and also expressed appreciation for the committee’s work. Julia was able to report on the school’s response to the contract, which was positive. Friends approved the contract. As the committee has completed its work, Friends also approved the laying down of the ad hoc committee.

7. Susan Inglis, presented the finalized Nominations Committee Annual Report and slate of committee members starting 7/1/2024. A few updates had been made since the May MWAB. The updated report is attached here as Appendix 1. Friends asked clarifying questions and requested that the report include our representatives to AFSC and to FCNL, among the others that the committee does not appoint. With discussion and clarification of several points, Friends approved the report.

8. David Waterman, for the Finance Committee, presented the proposed budget for fiscal year 2024-25 from Finance Committee, noting that the budget is tighter than last year, with a reduction of income and of expenses by about \$4000, despite a significant industry-wide jump in insurance cost (which is due to increased cost of replacement and construction.) It had been published in the May MWAB minutes, and then was finalized as shown in Appendix 2. David responded to questions and Friends approved.

9. Ann presented a minute of appreciation for outgoing Recording Clerk, Susan Inglis:

Chapel Hill Friends Meeting appreciates the consistent and diligent work of our Recording Clerk, Susan Inglis, over the past three years. We are grateful for her service.

Friends approved and Susan expressed appreciation.

10. Ann called for other concerns of members, to be identified only and simply heard or referred.

Friend introduced a benevolences discussion, noting current guidelines are that our gifts go to organizations that are Quaker-led and/or include strong involvement of our members. She reported that Peace & Justice suggests a 3rd guidance, "organization working in an area important to us and an organization we greatly admire, an organization that many of us believe is worthy."

Friend commented that she is moved today by how much work everyone on the screen puts in to making our meeting work. She expressed appreciation of our meeting and all members and attenders and the time we put in working, which is so different from most churches.

11. Ann noted there will be no MWAB in July. The next Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business is planned for 9:00 AM on 8/18/2024.

Announcements:

1 – AFSC info on Gaza is published in their weekly email. All invited to have a look. Also invited to attend 2 weekly zoom meetings with other meetings.

2 – AFSC: Betsy and Dottie attended an AFSC event at Binkley Baptist and an initiative called Apartheid-free.

3 – Ramallah Friends School, where Betsy lived for 2 years about 10 years ago while she wrote the history of the school, is in trouble. There is 60% unemployment in the West Bank and parents cannot pay tuition. The Head of School will be in NC in July. Friends are encouraged to visit the school's facebook page and see the graduating class. There are currently 1200 student in grades K-12. They are the future leaders.

The Nominations Committee seeks to identify and call forth the gifts and talents of attenders and members of our Meeting for service within the Meeting and in the larger community. Throughout the year, the committee works with other Meeting committees to identify the interests and skills needed for committees to fulfill their missions. The committee initiates the search for nominees, often asking other committees and individual members of the Meeting community to help identify likely candidates. The Nominations Committee seeks to align the gifts and interests of individuals with the work of Meeting committees and of organizations receiving Meeting appointees. The Committee brings nominations for vacancies in Meeting committees and appointees for the next program year (July-June) to the May Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business (MWAB) for review. Nominations presents a final report to the June MWAB.

Nominations also finds appropriate members and attenders to fill position vacancies as they occur. The Committee reviews the Recording Clerk, Treasurer, Recorder, Correspondence Clerk, and Trustee positions as the terms are due to be completed. The Committee also organizes a discernment process to identify a new Meeting Clerk every three years prior to completion of the clerk's term.

Vacancies on the Nominations Committee are nominated each fall by a Naming Committee, identified by the Clerk and approved by the MWAB.

This year the Nominations Committee has found it challenging to fill all seats on all committees. We believe, however, that most committees have sufficient participation for functionality. The exception is our Peace & Justice Committee, whose membership is small and static. The committee has sought guidance from our Ministry & Worship and Care & Counsel committees. Our hope is that members and attenders will be led to come forward and fill existing vacancies on the following committees:

- Childrens and Youth Religious Education
- Finance
- Interfaith Council
- Peace & Justice
- Publications and Communications
