Book Review from Nancy Milio:

Fit for Freedom, Not for Friendship

A path-breaking account of American Quaker relations with African Americans since the first settlements is now available in a new, highly documented book, *Fit for Freedom, Not for Friendship*, just published by Friends General Conference. [www.fgcquaker.org]. The authors, a European-American and African American, both Quakers, spent years painstakingly gathering evidence to tell a story that will challenge modern Quakers' assumptions about our positions on slavery, Quaker ownership of people, equal rights, integration, acceptance of blacks in Quaker schools, churches, meetings, colleges, organizations, and in social activities. Even the Chapel Hill and Durham meetings get a mention. The conclusions and insights the authors offer will be welcomed by all those who seek truth and want to work for justice and equality. A final thought: perhaps if enough people asked Amazon.com about the book, they might list it—and then I think it could take off in the wider community, to everyone's benefit. It's in paper and hardback, about \$27.

Book Review from Emily Buehler:

***Prayers of the Cosmos* by Neil Douglas-Klotz**

Prayers of the Cosmos is an alternative translation of the Lord's Prayer and the Beautitudes. The author explains how Aramaic words have multiple meanings, and the fullness of Jesus's message might have been lost in the translation of his Aramaic to Greek and then to English.

The verses are presented one by one in Aramaic (with phonetic pronunciations), then in the King James version, and finally in a new possible translation; each verse becomes a prayer or poem. Then there are "textual notes" and "body prayers" to accompany each verse. For example, "Hallowed be Thy name" translates into something like "Clearing Space for the Name to Live" and includes verses "Focus your light within us—make it useful" and "Help us let go, clear the space inside of busy forgetfulness: so the Name comes to live."

While the new translation did not particularly speak to me, I found the idea of alternative translations fascinating and was glad to have insight into Aramaic and what Jesus's message might have encompassed.

**CHAPEL HILL FRIENDS MEETING
SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE MEETING REPORT
2009**

Members and attenders of the Chapel Hill Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends gathered on February 12, 2009 to consider the spiritual state of our meeting. We reflected on two queries: how is your spiritual life nourished by our Chapel Hill Friends Meeting community and what are your desires for deepening and strengthening the spiritual life of our Chapel Hill Friends Meeting? There were 28 in attendance. We considered the first query in the whole group through worship sharing then broke up into small groups to consider the second query. We then reported back to the whole group and closed with worship.

We have a vibrant and healthy meeting where most people report feeling nourished by the many activities and the spiritual depth of our worship together. Friends agree that gathering together for worship is central to their lives. “Whenever we worship, we are bringing God into the world.” Personal sharings, evening programs, books groups, and forums enrich our spiritual lives. Our work on committees brings us together as well.

As our meeting grows larger, we are challenged to find ways to know each other. In addition to the two meetings for worship at the meetinghouse, we now have a separate meeting for worship Sunday mornings at Carol Woods established by residents there. In considering the second query, a theme emerged for more small group opportunities to share our spiritual search, know each other more deeply, and feed the spiritual dimension in our lives outside of meeting. We also feel a desire for our vocal ministry to spring from a deeper source and be the result of daily worship, meditation, and quiet. We need to offer more support to each other for developing our own individual spiritual practice. We also need to strive to share the leadership and work of the meeting so no one is overworked. Socializing after early meeting or before the second meeting can be difficult because there is no time. We need somehow to increase attendance at forums, business meeting, and the state of the meeting. A suggestion was put forth that we consider attendance at business meeting an expectation not just an invitation. Some would like to return to the days when we had one meeting for worship during the summer so we could worship together and know each other as a community. We would benefit from cultivating an appreciation of the diversity among us in our spiritual messages. We struggle to balance the tendency to get too busy doing things with the need for quiet reflection and just being. And too often we fail to reach out to people when they drift away from meeting.

Our spiritual life as individuals and as a community is an ongoing daily experience. During the course of the year, Ministry and Worship plans to set out these two queries at different points for the meeting community to worship on:

1. How is your spiritual life nourished by our Chapel Hill Friends Meeting community?
2. What are your desires for deepening and strengthening the spiritual life of our Chapel Hill Friends Meeting?

In conclusion, we are grateful for the vitality of our meeting community. Yet there are many ways in which we need to grow. We encourage the entire meeting to engage in the deepening and strengthening of our spiritual life as a community.

**REPORT TO THE MEETING ON THE AD HOC
COMMITTEE ON ENGAGING AMERICAN MUSLIMS
March 25, 2009**

Committee Members: Barbara Conger, Nancy Milio, Diane Rowley, Miriam Thompson, and Curt Torell

On Feb. 8, Nancy and Curt met with Mona Dakrouri and three other members of MAS (Muslim American Society, Raleigh Chapter) at their facilities in Raleigh. We discussed ways for mutual collaboration and service as well as getting acquainted with each other, our faiths, and our representative organizations.

On March 8, the full Ad Hoc Committee met for the first time. Though brief because of schedule conflicts, we reviewed our task and set directions.

During these past two months, we also started a resource list American Muslim groups and individuals in the area and other educational materials.

For upcoming events, Mona will present a forum on April 26 entitled *Islam: Core Beliefs and Values*. She will touch upon the main messages of Islam and the Qur'an, how different cultures have embraced Islam, how it views war and peace, and how we might reach out to our Muslim brothers and sisters to create better understanding and respect of each other. Mona is gifted and brings a wealth of knowledge in Islam, the Qur'an, and interfaith dialogue. Mona also helped us with a forum on Oct. 5 that introduced the need for this Ad Hoc Committee. We are fortunate to have her with us.

The next meeting of the committee is scheduled for Sunday, March 29.

Hank noted that Graeme Durovich should be added to the list of committee members.

YOUTH RELIGIOUS EDUCATION COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT April 2009

The Youth Religious Education Committee continues to develop, oversee, and support all curricula and activities involving young Friends in Grades 6 through 12. This report covers committee work from March 2008 to date. In brief, our strengths continue to be: (1) numerous youth involved in First Day School and extracurricular activities, (2) a focused and effective First Day School Coordinator (3) a reliable teacher for both the high school and middle school groups and (4) consistent leadership for the high school program that has built trust and communication between youth and adults.

Middle School

The Middle School curriculum in the fall placed emphasis on building community by exploring Quaker principles while experiencing the outdoors and remaining physically active. Teacher Dan Hilgenberg deserves much thanks for his consistent dedication to the middle school youth and tireless efforts to make First Day School stimulating and engaging. Outside of class, the Middle School group participated in a lock-in at the meeting house together with the high school youth. Recognizing the small size of the middle school group, the Committee has worked at increasing the number of participants and at identifying ways to engage the youth.

High School

The High School curriculum follows youth interests to line up a variety of topics that generate lively discussions. Teens continue to take responsibility for programming. Topics have included visits from the UNC Muslim Student Association, election '08, environmental concerns, experimentation with improvisation, Buddhist thought, Quakerism in Bolivia, and ethical decision making. John Hite has continued to provide excellent leadership for the high school group.

The high school group is much diminished in number compared with last year, as we lost many graduating seniors. The current number is 17, down from 27. This has created some new challenges for the group, most notably having enough youth present and available for FDS and activities to make them appealing and successful. A lock-in was held in the fall with middle and high school youth participating. Other activities include a combined service/beach trip to Quaker house last summer and a video scavenger hunt.

Other Activities

During the summer months, middle school joins the high school group for First Day School and Sunday evening activities which included movies, serious discussions, game nights, yoga, cooking and other activities. This past summer we had lower than usual attendance at Sunday evening gatherings.

This year, the possibility of the middle and high school group convening their own, youth-led “Junior Business Meeting” was explored. This would allow youth to take responsibility for determining what activities youth would engage them, and give them first hand experience in Quaker process. Several attempts at business meeting yielded mixed results, due mainly to inconsistent attendance and low numbers of youth participating.

Chapel Hill youth have consistently attended and energized retreats held by the Southern Appalachian Young Friends (SAYF). Fourteen of the current high school and middle school youth have participated in SAYF retreats. With leadership from Wren Hendrickson, Buffie Webber and Madeline Parker as youth nurturer, Chapel Hill has hosted a weekend retreat and traveled around the region to the benefit of many of our youth and their counterparts. Thus, SAYF is a nurturing community in which many of our youth have flourished, and at the same time, the SAYF community has benefited from the participation of those in our vibrant youth group.

Because our Meeting is not a member of SAYMA, yet SAYMA supports SAYF financially, YRE desired to make a fair-share financial contribution to SAYF. This contribution is in addition to the \$25 per

person fee that youth pay at each event. In August 2008, the CHFYMRE committee approved instructing the Treasurer to send \$500 to SAYF for the fiscal year 2008-2009. Future SAYF contributions will be made based on SAYF needs and on the level of involvement of our youth. (We have had a large number of youth participating actively in SAYF in recent years; many of our most active youth have graduated from high school in the last two years.)

Due to the very different composition of the group of FDS attenders this year, a survey was conducted of the high school and middle school youth to learn about their experience of the youth program at CHFM. The survey revealed an overall high satisfaction with FDS and other youth activities. The youth are grateful to John Hite, Dan Hilgenberg and other adults involved with the program for their support. A query was made into specific areas of interest for FDS discussions and activities and this will be used to guide future curriculum development and activity planning.

Curt Torell and Alice Carlton from the NC Choices for Youth (formerly the Conscientious Objector Guidance subcommittee) continue to assist young Friends in understanding issues and opportunities and the need to declare a CO status if so inclined.

YRE Committee members and youth make regular use of email lists and social networking websites to support youth activities. Other accomplishments include significant fundraising through football parking. This fall, our youth and supportive adults raised \$5,210 from willing and generous football fans.

Representation of youth in the YRE committee meetings this year has been good. Youth have played an active role in event planning and decision-making and in committee work with the larger meeting. As an example, Graeme Durovich is a member of the Meeting's Ad Hoc Committee set up to help engage and understand American Muslims.

Finally, our YRE policies and procedures were reviewed and updated. Policies that were updated or clarified include: adult supervision of overnight YRE sponsored events, health forms and other budgetary issues. A copy of these revised policies has been submitted to

the meeting along with this annual report.
