An Ongoing Couple Enrichment Group will begin meeting once per month this fall. Couples who have taken a couple enrichment workshop (at the Gathering or elsewhere) are invited to join this group. The first meeting will be on September 7 from 6 to 9 pm at the Green's house in Durham. This will be a potluck and organizational meeting primarily. The group will also meet Sept 22, Oct. 13, Nov. 10, and Dec. 8 at the Durham Friends Meetinghouse. Participating couples are asked to make a commitment to attend as many of these dates as possible. Andrew and Jessica will also be leading a Couple Enrichment (CE) Workshop under the care of the FGC Couple Enrichment program at the Durham Friends Meetinghouse. Mike and Marsha will attend to support and mentor Andrew and Jessica. The workshop will take place over two weekends: Friday, October 22 from 6-9 pm, Saturday October 23 from 9 am to 3 pm, Friday October 29 from 6-9 pm and Saturday October 30 from 9 am to 3 pm. Couples need to plan to attend the entire workshop since each session builds on the last. Participation in this workshop will prepare couples to participate in the Ongoing CE Group once it starts up again in January/ February, if interested. Space in the CE Workshop is limited, so interested couples should contact Andrew and Jessica as soon as possible and no later than October 1. Benevolence Budget Recommended by the Peace & Social Concerns Committee August 29, 2010

In light of discussion at the May Meeting for Business and new information about the financial resources of organizations, the Peace and Social Concerns recommends increasing by \$1,000 each the amounts recommended in May for the Carolina Friends School, The Friends Committee on National Legislation, and the American Friends Service Committee. From a staff of 410 in 2008, AFSC reduced staff in 2010 to only 236 persons. AFSC also consolidated or closed offices in Afghanistan, Colombia, Democratic Republic of Congo, Jordan, South Africa, and in six U.S. offices. FCNL has cut programs and reduced staff from 43 in 2007 to only 27.5 in 2010.

Eldercare Services in Exchange for Rent

Dear Friends,

My name in Stephen Zunes. I grew up in Chapel Hill and was a regular attender in the early to mid-1970s. Before my academic career and other responsibilities became too distracting, I used to write regularly for Friends Journal and led worship sharing groups at a number of FGC gatherings. My wife, Nanlouise Wolfe, was on the FGC staff in the early to mid-1980s.

Some of you may know of my father, the Rev. John Zunes, who was a co-founder of the weekly peace vigils during the 1960s and worked closely with Friends on a number of social concerns. Against our advice, he has recently left a retirement community here in California where he had been living for a couple of years to return to his home in Chapel Hill. He is capable of doing many things himself, but he has moderate dementia and could use someone who might be able to put in 10-12 hours per week driving him places, making sure he takes his medicine and is eating regularly, and can generally keep an eye on things. No formal training in elder care is necessary. Ideally, we would like a grad student or some other responsible young adult who could live rent-free in his house in exchange for such services.

A Brief Overview of Hinduism

(The following is a summary of Chapter 2 of the book "What the Great Religions Believe" by Joseph Gaer, from the Meeting library. I've used masculine pronouns since that's what the author used.)

The world always was and always will be; it was not created. Hinduism has no founder or creed, but certain beliefs are held by most Hindus: there is one Universal Spirit without beginning or end, called *Brahman* (which means World-Soul). Brahman includes *Brahma*, the Creator; *Vishnu*, the Preserver, and *Shiva*, the Destroyer. This Triad creates, monitors, and destroys the world in a continuous cycle. Vishnu appears on earth in human form to guide and enlighten man. Brahman does not have anthropomorphic characteristics.

Man is part of Brahman; his body is like a robe that is worn until it wears out, while his soul endures forever. The body is ruled by passion, desire, and meaningless ambition, while the soul is ruled by serenity and the tranquil search for truth. Man

should try to live in harmony with his soul in order to attain truth and understand the ultimate nature of reality. This means not being moved by joy or sorrow, but submitting to fate. Tranquility will lead to "right thinking" and then to "right acts."

The caste system is prescribed by Hinduism. When Brahma created the first man, different "classes" of people came from different parts of his body. The classes had different jobs, social standing, and rights. A man could not rise to a new caste or interact with members of different castes. Over time the castes subdivided, and a casteless class ("untouchables" or "outcastes") resulted, probably from offspring of illicit unions.

Karma is the Law of the Deed, which teaches that good leads to good, and evil to evil. Thoughts and acts are either good or evil and are compensated or punished, although not necessarily immediately. Souls are reincarnated; they can be rewarded or punished in future incarnations. When a soul is finally pure, it is released from the cycle and joins Brahman forever; this state is *Nirvana*. The *Yogas* are disciplines that can help a man reach Nirvana. The *Dharma* or Law of Moral Order can also help; there is no one Dharma, but each man must discover Dharma for himself. The *Vedas* are the eldest of the sacred books and include hymns, prayers, chants, spells, and beliefs.
