### **IFC News: Chris Moran's Retirement**

After almost 30 years of service to the Inter-Faith Council for Social Service (IFC), 17 as its first full-time Executive Director, and following time for reflection after a recent health scare and time away on medical leave, Chris has notified the Board of Directors of the IFC that the time for his retirement has come. He requested the Board's permission to seek the conclusion of his term as Executive Director effective July 1, 2013. With regrets and heaviness, the Board of Directors has accepted Chris' resignation and retirement.

Among Chris' many accomplishments are the development of Project HomeStart for homeless women and children; the new Community House for homeless men; the proposed FoodFirst to combine the Community Kitchen & the Food Pantry and the Robert Nixon Free Clinic for the Homeless, which now includes a mental health clinic. As a partner agency of the United Way of the Greater Triangle, Chris pushed the IFC to achieve the Agency of Excellence designation. Chris has guided the IFC through good economic times and bad, always seeking services and funds for those in need.

Chris and the IFC continue to join together in support of the IFC and of the capital campaign to make the new Community House a reality. John Dorward, the Associate Director, will serve as the Interim Executive Director while a search is competed for the IFC's second Executive Director. For over 10 years, John and Chris have worked together to address the needs of the poor and marginalized in our community. With the acknowledgment that Chris has left big shoes to fill, the IFC is ready for the challenge of continuing to serve our community.

### Book Review: Does Jesus Really Love Me? A Gay Christian's Pilgrimage in Search of God in America by Jeff Chu Submitted by Emily Buehler

Note: I don't think the local libraries have this book. I'd be happy to lend my copy as long as it is returned to me.

Jeff Chu grew up in a Baptist church with a preacher for a father. When he accepted his homosexuality and came out, he felt rejected by both his church family and his gay friends, who could not understand why he was "hanging on" to his religion. He had a lot of uncertainty about being both gay and Christian and decided to go on a pilgrimage, visiting people and places in America that might provide insight.

His memoir is a chance to experience all kinds of Christianity, from the Westboro Baptist Church (infamous for their use of slogans like "God Hates Fags"), to churches that seek to "rehabilitate" gay people, to mainline denominations that are struggling to find unity on the issue, to churches like Highlands in Denver that are not following any proscribed rules. It was interesting to get a first-hand glimpse into many communities and lives. Also, as someone who has always avoided things that seem hyper-Christian (like Christian rock music and Campus Crusade for Christ), it was interesting to meet people who are really into that stuff, and to see that they might really be "feeling it." (I always kind of assumed they were faking their devotion, since I never feel anything like it.)

While the book was interesting, it seemed more like a documentary than a memoir. The author tells other people's stories well, but after the first few chapters, there is very little about himself. He might comment with some thoughts here or there, but I wanted to know how he was feeling or changing each step of the way. He might have been trying not to "interfere" with the other person's story, but I wish he had told us more of what he thought. I did not feel invested in the outcomes of all the people he met, and I also had trouble keeping track of them all. By the end of each chapter, I could not remember who was who. In contrast, I felt very uncomfortable reading verbatim email exchanges between the author and people he met; I didn't think I knew him well enough to be reading his emails, and reading the emails of his contacts felt like an invasion of their privacy (although I am sure he had their permission). I wonder if maybe he wrote and published the book too soon, instead of waiting for things to settle and drawing out more learning from his experiences.

I think this book is worth reading if you are interested in learning more about the conflict (or perceived conflict) between homosexuality and Christianity. You'll read many ideas about interpreting the Bible and about what Christianity really means. The interviews are presented fairly and without judgement. The middle chapters got somewhat depressing for me, because of the characters who were trying so hard to repress themselves to do what they thought God wanted. The last few chapters made me wonder if the author has ever heard of Quakers, and how he would describe us.
