## Crop Walk Results

In spite of a steady rain on April 19th, the CROP Walk went off as planned, and only a few walkers were deterred by the weather. The CHFM had a respectable delegation including Lolly Dunlap with Savannah Crites and family; Naveed Moeed with Denver; Loretta and Marie Hopper; Gwynne Pomeroy; Andrea Wuerth with Herbert Struemper and family; Allison Campbell and family; Julia Cleaver; Carolyn Stuart; Karen Merrey; Alice Carlton; and Dave Curtin, who was our proud standard bearer. As usual, Asta and her grandson, Eric, were at the front of the line of walkers.

The purpose of this walk is to raise money for hunger/poverty alleviation programs locally and globally. This year our combined efforts raised a total of \$3,722. We sold an astounding 67 t-shirts for donations of \$576, all of which goes to IFC. Of the donations

received by walkers, 25% will go to our local IFC and 75% will go to the Church World Service for their projects.

Thank you to everyone who signed up to walk, sponsored a walker or bought a T-shirt.

#### **Invitation**

Our Friends Meeting, as part of our community service, prepares, and serves lunch once a month at the IFC Community Kitchen on West Rosemary Street (corner of N. Columbia and W. Rosemary)—on the first Thursday of every month from 9 am to 12:30 pm. Early volunteers prepare the menu from generous food supplies available and start preparing it with guidance from the shelter's staff. Volunteers coming a bit later help with meal preparation and serving.

This is a truly fun experience. It's amazing the nutritious meals we put together with food donated to the kitchen, and the more people we have to help through the morning, the merrier! We will be short-staffed over the summer, but the need is always there. So come and join the team for a couple of hours, parking is available in the adjoining lot, and have a lot of fun while doing good work! #### **IFC Food Pantry**

Donations to the IFC food basket in our foyer fell off dramatically after the holidays. However, the need never ends. Our business meeting agreed to a goal of 150 nonperishable food items or toiletries each month, but our food/toiletry donations have been way below that mark since January. We could easily meet or even surpass our goal if everyone gave 2-3 items a month. You don't need to make a special trip to the store; just select some staples from your own pantry. If you can't remember to do that, put some money into the IFC donations bag next to the bathroom door. A donation of only \$5 is counted as 3 items. All donations are picked up weekly by Karen Merrey, who takes them to the IFC Pantry on the following Friday.

## A Message from Ruth Hamilton

Dear Friends,

It has been six months since our beloved youngest son, Brendan Wenberg, age 35, took his life in Austin, TX. You were informed as soon as it happened and I felt that giving updates to Chapel Hill Friends Meeting and to Durham Friends Meeting gave me support for the days ahead. Most of the time I was focused on the difficult details that have to be carried out when there is a sudden tragic death in the family. But we all got through this together. Brendan's memorial service was at Chapel Hill Friends Meeting for Nov. 22, 2014. The service was perfect in every way. Suzanne Mays played the lyre as we entered. My partner in Carolina Ha Ha, Rog Bates wrote the song, "Brendan's Art is for Everyone" and we all sang it together. Brendan's high school friends walked in together and filled an entire pew. Rev. Won Gong and Rev. Ginger of the Won Buddhist Temple offered an appropriate chant. Many friends and family shared humorously about Brendan and those who never met him thanked us for the biography we provided. Hank Elkins provided silver ribbon pins and spoke about the NAMI Campaign for the Brain and the CHFM Mental Health Initiative. We set up a slide show of Brendan's life during the reception. A sample of his art was on display. You all provided the delicious refreshments. I can say now that this day remains a comforting memory and you all helped to make it so.

That night after the memorial service, CHFM members and especially the Mental Health Group, provided food for our family dinner. It was very scrumptious food that also went home with my older son, Jack, and kept the younger family and friends well fed. After the meal, we sat around the wood stove and sang old time songs and hymns accompanied by long time friends playing guitar. This was a very healing night and most enjoyable.

The CHFM Mental Health Group also hosted a pot luck for us on Nov. 29. This was a time for me to share openly and to offer suggestions from my experience of how families suffering like us can be supported. Out of this meeting, I want to offer a few suggestions. First, please refer to the cause of death as "taking his/her own life" rather than "committing suicide." The later connotes that a sin or crime has been committed. Second, please don't ask for details about how the death occurred. This can cause "copy cat" response and is difficult for the family members to keep repeating. Third, I reported at this time that the most helpful comment that I received was, "We will get through this together." The cards and emails I received were also much appreciated and comforting. From where I am now, I would like to add that probably one of the most difficult phases of the healing is happening now. After all the necessary details of probate, moving Brendan's business, and housing his girlfriend for three months, I realize how very tired I am and how much I miss Brendan.

I am now planning the South West Celebration of Brendan's Life on June 27, 2015, 2-4:30 pm. This will be held at Santa Fe Friends Meeting, 640 Canyon Rd., also famous for the artist galleries. It will be a gallery showing of Brendan's paintings, sculptures, and his t-shirts. It will also be a time for Brendan's many artist friends to share their memories. I look forward to having another event honoring Brendan, but at the same time I will miss all the

support I received from my Friends in NC. Go to Friends of Brendan Wenberg on Face Book for more details.

Around Sept. 15, I plan to return to the Triangle area and will look forward to seeing many of you. I will also be visiting the Riverside Cemetery in Smithfield, NC to see, for the first time, Brendan's memorial stone. It is here that Brendan shares a grave site with our beautiful two year old, Heather Lea, who died on Oct. 15, 1975. Here in NM, I put Brendan's ashes in a large ant hill on a mountain ridge at our desert house. I decorated it with crystals, beautiful minerals, and Tibetan peace flags. These memorial sites are part of my healing and also give me creative expression.

Thanks again for all you did to help us honor Brendan. Please continue to hold us all in the Light for our healing continues. Love to you all, Ruth Hamilton

- 1. Dennis Hargrove and Tim Gurley were attending for the first time.
- 2. The April minutes were approved as written.
- 3. The Clerk read a membership request from Eloise Grathwohl. A membership clearness committee is being established by M&W.
- 4. Carolyn Stuart presented Nomination Committee's proposed committee membership roster for 2015-2016 (enclosed). The Meeting for Worship with attention to Business will reconsider the nominations for approval in June. Publications and Records and Care and Counsel both still need an additional member. Nominations is waiting to identify members for Peace & Justice until after the Meeting discerns the committee's new role. Appreciation was expressed for the committee's good work.
- 5. Matt Drake presented the proposed 2015-16 budget (enclosed). The budget will be considered for approval in June. Next year's budget is based on this year's budget. We will not know until the end of Fiscal Year how closely last year's income and expenses matched last year's budget but they were close., Finance committee expects that income will be slightly higher than projected. The committee is working on upgrading its computer and software, and may come to the Meeting with a request for additional expenditures for these purposes during the year. Appreciation was expressed for the work of the Committee.

- 6. Benevolences were presented last month for consideration and are now being brought forward for approval. Naveed Moeed represented Peace & J, Jan Hutton represented Ministry & Worship, and Wendy Michener represented ARE. Naveed reported that some descriptions of the proposed benevolences had been update. Wendy reported that the Adult Religious Education Committee had considered and approved those under the care of that committee. The benevolence recommendations were approved (proposal included in last month's newsletter).
- 7. Jan Hutton presented a revised description of Shotts/Leadership Development Committee as follows:
  - The committee works to publicize, at least annually, the purposes and availability of these resources, to find opportunities for their use, to review applications for grants, and to suggest that recipients, whenever possible, share their supported experiences with the rest of the CHFM community. The meeting approved the revised description.
- 8. Naveed read an Epistle from Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting, which had its first meeting in March 2015 (enclosed). As members, the start of this Yearly Meeting is momentous and offers an opportunity to be part of a gentle voice in these challenging times. We received the epistle with thanks.
- 9. Lynn Drake, co-clerk of Ministry and Worship, read a report on the Spiritual State of the Meeting Retreat (enclosed). Thanks were given to Naveed, Pam Schwingl, and Lloyd Kramer for planning and facilitating the retreat.
- 10. Naveed Moeed reported on the re-organization of Peace and Justice Committee. This was initially considered last month with the request that P&J confer with Publications and Communications (P&C). The Committee met with representatives from P&C. P&C is most concerned about overwhelming the listsery. In response to this concern, there will be a P&J calendar and events outside our Meeting's central concerns will be listed on the calendar. Existing guidelines will

continue to be followed for items that will be added to the listserv. P&J will work with P&C to maintain a list of concerned Friends and to manage how others access those Friends. The Meeting approved the revised description (reported in last month's newsletter). Thanks were expressed for the committee's thoughtful approach to considering and revising their role in the meeting given the bountiful number of issues of concern to members of our Meeting.

## 2015 Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting Epistle From the First Annual Session Third Month, Fourteenth Day 2015

Greetings to Friends Everywhere,

In a spirit of joy and anticipation, and after years of discernment Piedmont Friends Fellowship was led to take under its care the formation of a new yearly meeting. Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting (PFYM) emerged as a result of this nurture and we held our first Annual Session on Saturday afternoon, March 14th, 2015. PFYM intends to act as a 21st century yearly meeting well-grounded in Quaker tradition and history.

The yearly meeting intends to continue and build upon Piedmont Friends Fellowship's 47-year tradition of loving and inclusive fellowship. PFYM seeks to be a loving community of Friends in the Piedmont area and adjacent areas of North Carolina, Virginia and South Carolina, guided by spirit, and deepening our experience of Quaker worship, faith, and practice. The new yearly meeting seeks to strengthen our service and witness to the world through broadened connections with wider Quaker organizations.

Piedmont Friends Fellowship held its spring retreat and annual meeting on March 13-15,

2015. Ninety-two adult Friends and twenty young Friends from North Carolina, South Carolina,

and Virginia gathered under budding maple trees and worshipped in the historic New Garden Friends Meetinghouse in Greensboro, NC. Friends greeted each other with excitement and joy, and enjoyed unity in both worship and fellowship.

Within this loving context on the afternoon of March 14, Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting convened its first Annual Session with 76 Friends in attendance. Five North Carolina monthly meetings, a Virginia monthly meeting and a South Carolina worship group minuted their affiliation with the new Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting: Chapel Hill, Charlotte, Fancy Gap (VA), New Garden, Raleigh, and Salem Creek Friends Meetings, and Upstate (SC) Worship Group. Friends then proceeded to establish basic elements of the

new yearly meeting through approval of recommendations from the Piedmont Friends Fellowship Yearly Meeting Formation Committee and the Interim Body of Representatives from affiliating meetings—groups that had been working jointly on these recommendations for two years. First to be approved were The Vision Statement and Core Elements, intended to clarify the guiding principles of the new yearly meeting. The last sentence of the Vision Statement reads, "Our primary goals are to nurture monthly meetings and worship groups by supporting spiritual growth and to witness to our collective truth in the wider world." The Core Elements include inward experience of the spirit leading us to loving ways; Quaker practices of discernment, continuing revelation and outward expression of truth in our lives; inclusiveness and welcoming a diversity of individuals and families into our meetings; strengthening our monthly meetings and worship groups; holding to a simple and sufficient structure in the yearly meeting; and demonstrating transparency and openness in all of our actions. A copy of the Vision and Core Elements document is appended to this epistle.

Next PFYM approved a document which will serve as a guide to the relationship between Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting and Piedmont Friends Fellowship. The two entities will act in Friendly partnership, with the Fellowship developing programming (including youth programming), planning semi-annual workshops and retreats, maintaining a joint website, and handling finances. The Yearly Meeting will turn to the work of nurturing service to monthly meetings and strengthening service and witness in the world. Membership in the Yearly Meeting will require that the monthly meeting or worship group also begin or maintain active membership in the Fellowship.

The final basic elements put in place by the new yearly meeting were approval of a beginning Policy and Procedures Handbook and approval of Friends to serve in the three positions provided in that Handbook: Presiding Clerk, Assisting Clerk, and Recording Clerk. The Handbook also provides for an Interim Meeting of representatives from affiliating meetings and worship groups, which will meet quarterly to do the work of the yearly meeting between

The PFF/YM weekend retreat was rich with activity before and after the yearly meeting annual session. Friends participated in a sharing of our spiritual

stories, led by Mary Kay Glazer from Friends General Conference (FGC) traveling ministries. We met in pairs and small groups to answer a variety of queries around our spiritual experiences. One of the highlights of the entire weekend was the storytelling exercise on the history of Piedmont Friends Fellowship and creation of Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting, by way of two or three sentence contributions from over twenty different Friends who rose and spoke out of the silence.

We heard from Lynn and Steve Newsom, directors of Quaker House, which was born in 1969 from the efforts and discernment of Piedmont Friends Fellowship and continues to be a strong witness for peace and healing among military personnel. We also heard about the important work of the American Friends Service Committee in our area from AFSC Friend Lori Fernald Khamala, and the supportive services of FGC from visiting Friend, Eric Evans. Young Friends were treated to a campus tour of nearby Guilford College. Later, some of us participated in a musical drumming session and evening bonfire. Inspired by the yearly meeting annual session, some 18 Friends met to establish a yearly meeting ad hoc working group around local peace and social concerns activities in our various communities.

Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting, in partnership with Piedmont Friends Fellowship, will continue our inward search for spiritual growth and outward witness and service to the world with much joyful unity.

# Annual Spiritual State of the Meeting Report of the Chapel Hill Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends May 17, 2015

We gathered in the school building on March 21, 2015, to reflect on the spiritual state of our Meeting in relation to our recent decision to join Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting and in appreciation of the various activities that have occurred during and since our 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2012. The meeting consisted of three sets of queries and discussions described below.

We began by considering some organizations in the wider Quaker fellowship and their mission statements. In small groups, we answered the query, "How do we envision the meaning of our personal and corporate relationships with local and national Quaker groups?" Sharings on the responses to this query in the large group revealed a resonance with many of the mission statements, an excitement about the opportunities ahead to connect more fully with fellow travelers, a recognition of the chance to help shape the formation of the new Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting, an awareness of the challenges of deepening relationships with those who are different from us, and a concern about the energy needed to make these commitments outside the Chapel Hill Friends Meeting. One Friend spoke about seeing a great people gathered to influence North Carolina.

After reviewing the listing of activities that have occurred during and after the Meeting's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2012 and adding to that list (see attached), we responded to this query: "How have any of these programs deepened your understanding of Quakerism?" There was gratitude expressed for the care and thoroughness of the sub-committee on discernment about joining Piedmont Friends Yearly Meeting that resulted in our coming together as a Meeting and the unity that was reached on this decision. Many other activities engaged in by the Meeting during the past three years have enhanced personal understanding of Quaker practices and testimonies, from listening and decision-making processes to clearness committees and conflict transformation. Our prison ministry and mental health advocacy have strengthened our Meeting.

As we considered together our spiritual growth within a wider context, there was an appreciation for how a living community functions where each participant has a role but we are united in vibrancy and our searching for truth. Our attempts to balance our inward work with our outward work strengthen us. When we are led by the Spirit, our actions start from the heart and are successful. We marveled at the contributions to our worship that our guests from the Orange Correctional Center have shared with us, from their messages to their music.

Our final query was, "How could your spiritual life or the spiritual life of the meeting be changed and/or enhanced by others within and beyond our meeting? Our state?" Comments included the anticipation of new opportunities to deepen our ability to be in the Light through our experiences in the larger Quaker community, the need to be wise in finding the balance between taking on the new and the right exercise of the old, the need to strengthen our commitment to nurture the families in our Meeting, and the desire to keep our center strong. There was a suggestion that we invite other Meetings to worship with us and we should go to worship with them. We will experience growth by being exposed to different works in both Meetings and individuals.

During our closing worship, we were advised to remember the example of Margaret Fell.
