Orange County Justice United (JU) Fall Assembly to Advocate for Respectful Policing in Northern Orange County Thursday, September 15

Latino drivers in northern Orange County are being targeted for stops by the police to check for drivers licenses. Legislative action in 2006 reversed a 20 year policy allowing undocumented immigrants to receive drivers licenses. Currently only those with social security numbers may apply. Advocates note checkpoints for police stops near mobile home parks and other residential areas that house large numbers of Latino families. Some families have even been stopped as they drive their children to school. The targeting of Latino families by police in north Orange County has led to distrust between Latino communities and the police force.

Justice United is holding a county-wide meeting with police and advocates to discuss specific proposals to address this problem and allow Latino families to participate more widely in the community, including their children's schools. Please put this date on your calendar and plan to attend.

Opportunity: Director(s) of Quaker House

Quaker House, a landmark Friends peace witness, is seeking a Director(s) to continue an active program promoting peace and non-violence. It is located in Fayetteville, North Carolina, home of Fort Bragg, a major US military base.

Duties include: develop new programs to meet changing conditions; collaborate with Quakers, other churches and peace groups, extensive visitation among Friends and others; conduct fundraising, including fund appeals, soliciting and managing contributions from individuals or groups; supervise GI Rights Hotline counselors, Domestic Violence in the Military Counseling Program and administrative staff; counsel military personnel on conscience and discharge issues; write newsletters and respond to media inquiries; update the website, computer systems, databases, and QH archives; oversee building upkeep and maintenance.

Remuneration: beginning at \$38,000, based on experience; health and dental benefits; free housing and utilities in renovated home located in Fayetteville's historic district.

Qualifications: We seek a Director(s) who is closely aligned with and familiar with the Society of Friends and the Quaker peace testimony; and who understands the significance of upholding this light in a U. S. military setting. The position requires proven leadership, strong writing, fundraising, and management skills. Candidates must have the stamina to live for an extended period of time in a military community. Familiarity with concepts in military counseling and recruitment is desirable. The candidate(s) will preferably be available to attend some Quaker conferences during the summer of 2017 and begin full time in September of 2017.

Refugee Resettlement

In May our Meeting decided to co-sponsor a Syrian refugee family. The Syrian family of six moved in their home on Saturday evening – just in time to start school in Carrboro on Monday! Over the past two and a half months, 24 people and families and contributed furniture and furnishings. That have been stored in 10 locations. Beginning with the signing of the lease Friday afternoon, 36 people from our Meeting, including our Teens, Unitarian Universalist and Unity volunteers, and more friends drove six trucks, loaded and unloaded furnishings, and assembled a dwelling to which we felt honored to welcome the family.
