1. Opening worship and query – Matt Drake, Meeting Clerk. Query: How does our meeting nurture members in all stages of life?
2. Matt – Welcome, recognition of first time attenders, Betsy Brinson and Gordon Davies, review of agenda.
3. The minutes from the May 19, 2019 Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business were approved.
4. Hank Elkins reported for the ad hoc Naming Committee, consisting of himself and Tom Ludlow, the recommendation of Kathleen McNeil to join the Nominations Committee. We approved Kathleen McNeil for the Nominations Committee.
5. Don Hopper, Clerk, Building and Grounds Committee (B&G), gave an update on the meeting room renovations. The ceiling and walls have been finished and painted. Next the floor will be installed. The HVAC system has been adjusted to fit the new ceiling and passed inspection. Emergency lights outside have been installed as required by the Town of Chapel Hill. The painting crew moved the benches to the multi-purpose room on Friday, and Meeting volunteers cleaned them Saturday morning. Thanks to the volunteers. A next possible project will be renovation of the library and foyer. We thank Don Hopper for his service to the B&G Committee and to the Meeting as he steps down as Clerk of B&G and for shepherding us through the renovation project over many years. We will be able to return to worship in the meeting room in mid to late July. We accept Don’s report with great appreciation.
6. Carolyn White, member of Nominations Committee, presented the proposed nominations for Meeting officers, committees and appointees, service to start July 1, 2019, listing a few additions since last month. Betsy Brinson will join the Quaker House Board and the Library Committee. Quaker Harmon will join the Hospitality Committee. We approved these nominations with gratitude. The full initial report was included with the May minutes.
7. Ann Miller, Co-clerk of Finance Committee, presented the proposed 2019-2020 budget for the Meeting, starting July 1, 2019. The only change from last month is to add \$150 to the Library Committee to cover archives. Money was transferred from the physical plant fund to cover the cost of an Automated Emergency Defibrillator (AED), a one time purchase. We approved the budget with appreciation. The full initial report was included with the May minutes.
8. Dave Curtin, Clerk of Library Committee, requested that \$150 be contributed to the Quaker Historical Collection at Guilford College. We currently send our newsletters to their archives. The Archives Committee, now laid down, has made this contribution in the past. It is now requested that it be transferred to the Library Committee. We approved this contribution to now come through the Library Committee.
9. Matt shared a request from Betsy Fenhagen to be considered for membership. She writes: “I am writing to ask if I might formally become a member of the Chapel Hill Friends Meeting. For several months I have attended meetings here where I found the words “We enter to worship and go forth to serve” inspiring and an expression to which I would be honored to contribute.

We gave appreciation to Hospitality Committee for performing their duties so well during our time in the Multi-purpose room.

11. Hank Elkins, member of the Peace & Justice Committee, reported success in getting US Representatives Price and Butterfield to co-sponsor HR 1274 which would repeal the Authorization for Use of Military Force Act from 2001.

12. We extend our deep appreciation for the service of Matt Drake as Clerk of Meeting.

13. Next MWAB will be 9:00 am July 21, 2019 when we will welcome Chris Stanley as Clerk of Meeting.
